Rivane Neuenschwander: A Day Like Any Other

This major mid-career survey of the work of the internationally admired Brazilian artist Rivane Neuenschwander covers a decade of her work. *A Day Like Any Other* highlights her unique contribution to the narrative of Brazilian Conceptualism and reveals her wide-ranging, interdisciplinary practice that merges painting, photography, film, sculpture, installation, collaborative actions and participatory events. Three installations in the exhibition involve direct visitor participation. The first, *I Wish Your Wish*, 2003, is based on a tradition at a church in Salvador, Bahia, Brazil, where the faithful tie silk ribbons to their wrists and to the gates of the church; and, according to tradition, their wishes are granted when the ribbons wear away and fall off. At IMMA hundreds of similar ribbons will be printed with visitors' wishes from Neuenschwander's past projects exhibited elsewhere, and will hang from the gallery walls. Visitors are invited to remove a ribbon, tie it to their wrist, and replace it with a new wish written on a slip of paper. The continuation of the project generates new ribbons with new dreams.

For the second piece, *First Love*, 2005, a police sketch artist sits with visitors and listens as the visitors describe the faces of their first loves; the sketch artist then produces portraits of these "first loves" to adorn the walls of the gallery for the duration of the exhibition. For the third installation, *Walking in Circles*, 2000, small halos of adhesive are applied to the gallery floor to pick up dirt from visitors' shoes. The work creates a physical and temporal map of the exhibition's traffic patterns.



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In addition to these participatory actions and major installations, the exhibition also contains several series of new paintings and the film *The Tenant*, 2010, which follows the journey of a soap bubble as it wanders through a deserted house in a permanent state of suspension.

The exhibition is curated by Richard Flood, Chief Curator at the New Museum, New York and is organised by the New Museum in collaboration with IMMA.

Conversations: Photography from the Bank of America Collection

Conversations, an exhibition of over 100 photographs from the Bank of America collection, documents the evolution of photography and comprises early examples from the 1850s to the present day. The exhibition tracks the importance of photography as a medium which has only come to the fore in the last few decades, in terms of its acknowledgement within an art historical context. IMMA has hosted important photography exhibitions in the past; notably in collaboration with the Museum of Modern Art, (MoMA), New York, on *Picturing New York*, which featured a selection of images highlighting photographers' connections with New York City. In *Conversations*, there is also a link to MoMA as the parameters of Bank of America's renowned photography collection were originally set by leading photographic historians Beaumont and Nancy Newhall who also established MoMA's Photography Department.

Conversations reflects the importance of photography as a means of documenting not only the everyday, but also of expanding our visual lexicon of how we mediate the world around us. The works included in the exhibition document the distant past, as in *Seascape with Sailing Ship and Tugboat*, Normandy, taken in 1857 by Gustave Le Gray, to our contemporary world of sophisticated museum audiences, documented by Thomas Struth, in his monumental photograph from 2004, *Audience 4*.

The exhibition will include iconic photographers such as Robert Louis Frank, Dorothea Lange, Harry Callahan, Andreas Gursky and Thomas Ruff who capture the world's imagination through their unique vision.

The exhibition originated at the Museum of Fine Art, Boston and travelled to Museo del Novecento, Milan.

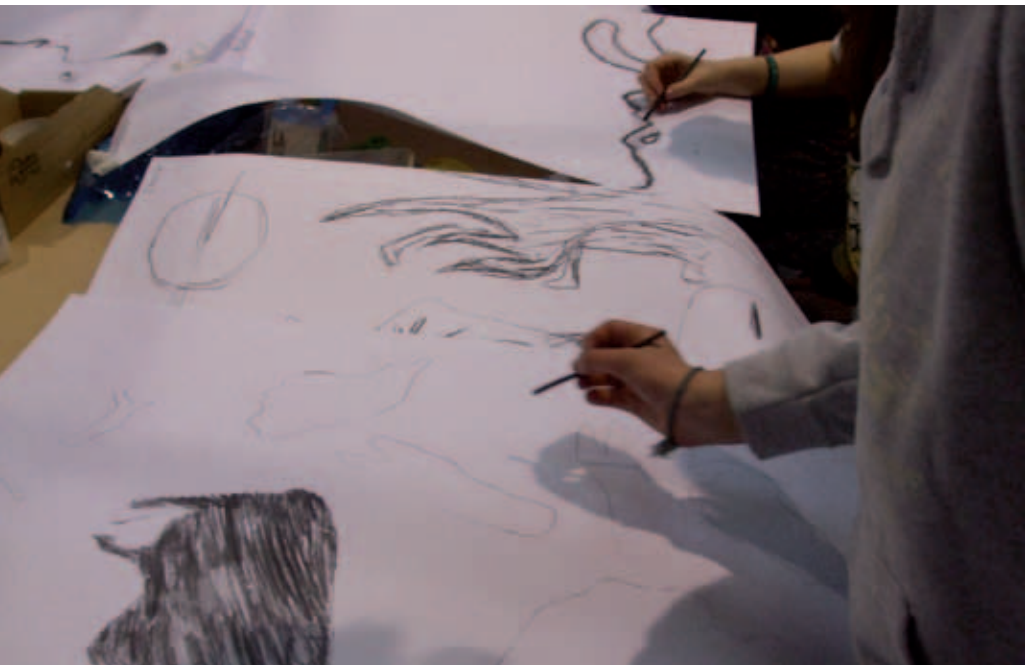

Artists' Residency Programme

The Artists' Residency Programme is the Irish Museum of Modern Art's studio / residency programme. ARP provides opportunities for artists to research and develop their practice, it supports both emerging and established artists, working in any medium by application or invitation and is open to Irish and international artists.

The ARP is a unique programme which is submerged in the urban context of contemporary Irish culture and life, as well as being located in Ireland's Museum of Modern Art; this prime location offers a natural catalyst for contemporary creativity and dialogue. The aim of ARP is to generate a fresh creative space for artists at a crucial point in their career and for the participating artists to leave IMMA with new experiences and networks that will enable them to further their opportunities following their time spent at the Museum. ARP is crucial for intercultural dialogue in Ireland and provides a rare platform for international artists to come and live in Dublin for a concentrated period of time within an affordable and creative context alongside participating Irish artists.

The Artists' Residency Programme will be closed over Winter 2011/2012. In Spring 2012 the ARP is implementing a programme which will focus on studio-based activities incorporating research projects and the use of its large ground floor studio spaces. 2012 is being programmed through invitation only by the Museum. The next open call for applications to the ARP will be announced in 2012 when IMMA will be seeking applications for 2013 programming.

ARP Practice and Projects

ARP emphasises the working process rather than the finished product and supports the exploration of new ideas and ways of working. ARP artists get an opportunity to engage in a dialogue with their peers and the visiting public through facilitating access to their studio work during their time at IMMA.

ARP Studio Visits

There are studio visits organised around the residencies, all of which are free and open to the public. Groups and individuals visiting IMMA can arrange to meet artists in their studios to engage with their work, as the artists' schedules permit. It is recommended that studio visits should be requested at least two weeks in advance of a preferred date.

ARP Conversations

Site-specific dialogues for which the artists are invited to discuss with the Museum the possibilities of an alternative public conversation related to their practice while on residency at IMMA. The aim of this series of dialogues is to generate an insightful and focused interaction with each of the participating artists, their work and the branching topics from their practices.

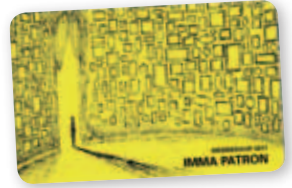

How to get to IMMA

Museum Entrance on Military Road.

By Luas: Red Line to Heuston Station (5 minutes walk via Military Rd).

By bus: Buses to Heuston Station (5 minutes walk via Military Rd): 26 from Pearse St; 51, 79 from Aston Quay; 90 Dart Feeder Bus from Connolly and Tara Street Stations to Heuston Station, 145 to Heuston Station from Bray.

Buses to James St (5 minutes walk via steps to Bow Lane onto Irwin St and Military Rd): 123 from O'Connell St/Dame St; 51B, 78A from Aston Quay.

By car: 10 minute drive from city centre.

New Parking Arrangements

Due to an increasing problem with non-Museum visitors leaving vehicles in the IMMA car park for lengthy periods, the Museum has put in place a carefully-structured payment system, which is being operated by Park Rite. This is designed to deter long-term parking while at the same time facilitating IMMA visitors with an initial charge of just €1 for the first three hours. The new arrangement will be monitored carefully in order to identify and deal with any unforeseen problems.

On foot: Approx. 30 to 40 minutes from city centre.

By train: 5 minute walk from Heuston Station; from Connolly and Tara Street Stations by 90 bus or Red Line Luas from Connolly Station to Heuston Station.

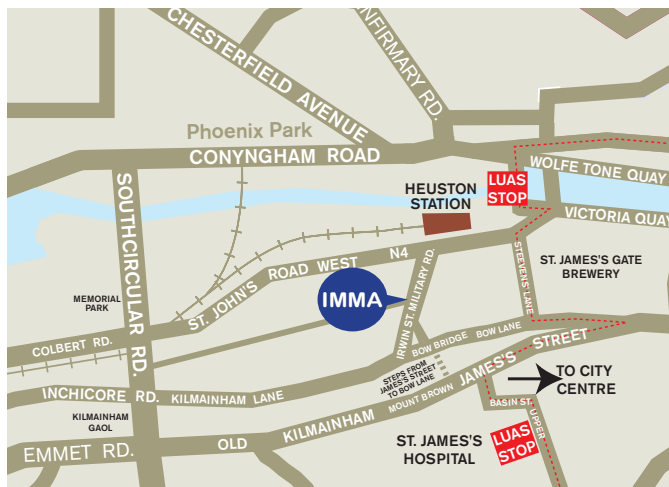

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Closure of Main Building

– November 2011 to December 2012

The Museum wishes to advise visitors that, owing to essential and extensive refurbishment works, the main building at IMMA will remain closed until 31 December 2012.

The works are being carried out by the OPW and involve a major upgrade of the Museum's lighting, security and fire safety systems. Work confined to the main Museum building includes the installation of a new wiring and lighting system, a greatly enhanced security capability and a more advanced fire detection system. A new hoist for artworks and an additional fire escape is also being put in place.

The works will significantly enhance the experience for visitors, with greatly improved lighting and flooring, and will restore access to the first floor galleries for wheelchair users and other lift-dependent visitors. In addition, these improvements to the buildings safety systems will enable part of the North Range to be used for exhibitions on a regular basis. The project will also reduce energy costs and enable the Museum to operate in a more environmentally efficient manner. The works are due to be completed in approximately one year, and the Museum is scheduled to reopen to visitors in January 2013.

Exhibitions are continuing in the New Galleries and the Artists' Residency Programme also continues on site during the closure. The café, bookshop and grounds are also remaining open to visitors. From April 2012, IMMA will also be presenting exhibitions and projects in Earlsfort Terrace, Dublin 2. These will include a major film work by Douglas Gordon, a mid-career retrospective by Alice Maher and a new exhibition from the IMMA Collection, complementing Ireland's hosting of the 2012 European Year of Science and echoing the building's history as a medical school, while the highly-successful National Programme will continue in venues around Ireland, North and South.
